

HIGH RESOLUTION ANOSCOPY (HRA) PREP	
1 DAY BEFORE	 DO NOT put any creams or medications into your anus DO NOT insert toys, fingers, or other objects into your anus DO NOT douche or use enemas DO NOT have receptive anal sex AFTER MIDNIGHT: STOP EATING You can consume CLEAR LIQUIDS up until 3 hours before the test Clear liquids include iced/hot tea, black coffee, clear broth, apple or white grape juice (without pulp), gingerale, jello, ice pops
MEDICATIONS	 If you are taking Medicines That Thin Your Blood: Contact your provider to discuss any adjustments that might be required Medications include but are not limited to Aspirin, Plavix, Coumadin, Lovenox, Eliquis, Xarelto If you are taking Aspirin: Do not hold it pre-procedure. Please take it the morning of your procedure with a small sip of water. If you are taking Blood Pressure Medication: Do not hold them pre-procedure. Take them the morning of your procedure with a small sip of water. If you are taking Diabetes Medications: Contact your prescribing doctor to discuss adjustments the day before and the day of your procedure
PROCEDURE DAY	 DO NOT DOUCHE OR USE ENEMAS Doing so can make it too difficult to see and we may not be able to do the procedure 3 HOURS BEFORE: STOP CLEAR LIQUIDS. No candy or gum either Take your regular medications in the morning with sips of water <u>Failure to follow these instructions may result in a delay or cancellation of your procedure</u>
ARRIVAL	 Arrive 30 minutes prior to your procedure, no later! Bring list of current medications including doses Bring a Photo ID Bring Insurance Card Bring any applicable Referrals

	Please do not bring any valuables
ESCORT	• Please ensure that you have an escort (responsible adult over the age of 18) to pick you up at the end of the procedure

WHAT TO EXPECT POST PROCEDURE

- You are expected to have post procedure anal pressure. This can last for a few days.
- For control of pressure, use over the counter Tylenol 325mg, 1-2 tabs every 8 hours as needed, for the first several days.
- Most patients DO NOT experience pain. Just in case you have pain, your health care provider may prescribe pain control medication.
 - If you are one of the few patients who requires pain control medication make sure to bring the rest of your prescription bottle to your follow up appointments.
- Spotting of blood may occur for the first few days after your procedure.
- **Delayed bleeding can occur, usually 1-2 weeks post procedure**, when the tissue heals and the scabs from the procedure site start to shed. **This is expected.**
